The Survey of Rural Decision Makers is a biennial survey of New Zealand's primary sector conducted by Manaaki Whenua – Landcare Research since 2013. In 2021, there were 6700 respondents representing commercial and lifestyle farms, forests and growing operations from Cape Reinga to Rakiura.



# **Aspirations for the land**

Respondents were asked to describe the aspirations for their land using 3-5 short phrases.

This was an open-ended question, and respondents could write absolutely anything. We read through all 3,580 answers from farmers, foresters, growers, and lifestyle block owners.

We found that many responses emphasised a **RETURN ON INVESTMENT** in the land:

66 Best production using technologies and systems to ensure optimal growth rates involving beef and sheep breeds that we like. 99

66 Our aspiration is that our land will provide us with food security and an additional income stream. 99

Still others focused on their farmer **IDENTITY AND RURAL LIFESTYLE:** 

> 66 ... it is the means towards our way of life. We identify as farmers, nearly all of our needs (physical, financial, emotional, mental, spiritual) are met through farming our land, outside, every day. 99

66 Great being my own boss. Been able to make my own decisions. 99

Others emphasised the land owner's aspiration to be good **ENVIRONMENTAL STEWARDS**:

66 To keep the land in good condition for future generations. We have been lucky to be the guardians of this land for the past 30 years and we are passionate about it. 99

66 A gate keeper for the next generation that leaves the land in a more sustainable and environmentally better place than when I bought it. 99

And some of responses covered **MULTIPLE THEMES:** 

66 Look after our farm for future generations, Be a good custodian environmentally, run a profitable sustainable dairy farm, have a good happy life. 99

66 Farm sustainably, while staying solvent. To be able to enjoy rural living, be able to pass the family land to future generations. 99


